Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Community-Based Civil Commitment

Assisted outpatient treatment (AOT) is a form of civil commitment that authorizes the judicial system to commit eligible individuals with severe psychiatric disorders to mental health intervention in the community.

Connecting Care for Better Outcomes

The significance of continuity of care for individuals moving among health, homelessness, criminal justice, and other systems, and considerations for improving handoffs that may produce beneficial individual and public outcomes.

Social Determinants of Health and Mental Health

An overview of the role of social determinants in propelling people toward poorer outcomes, including criminal justice system involvement. Strategies are presented for recognizing and considering determinants to mitigate risks and improve life trajectories.

Co-Occurring Mental Illness and Substance Use Disorders (CODs)

The history and issues presented by cooccurring mental illness and substance use disorders and the strategies courts can use to address them.
