The Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute Summarized the Key Themes that Emerged from the 2020-2021 Convenings. A more complete descriptions of these themes is available on the Behavioral Health and the Courts Website at <a href="https://www.ncsc/behavioralhealth">www.ncsc/behavioralhealth</a>.

- The critical role of the judiciary.
- The development and continued reliance on strategies within the justice system.
- The emergence of a broader systemic framework to prevent entry to the justice system.
- The emergence of philanthropic interest in creating solutions that can be brought to scale.
- A focus on recovery, rather than symptom relief, as the goal of treatment.
- A focus on intervening as early as possible, which means intercept zero (community services) of the sequential intercept model is the key intercept.
- A focus on assuring access to good quality care, regardless of geographic location.
- An emphasis on education of both judges/justice system participants and clinicians so that each understands the values and key concepts that inform the other.
- The importance of peers as part of the system of care.
- The pervasive impact of racism that contributes to the overrepresentation of Black and Brown people in the justice system.
- Reliance by the judicial system on psychological tests that have not been validated for use with persons of color.
- The impact of having a small number of mental health professionals of color.
- The importance of infusing cultural values into community systems.
- An emphasis on educating judges and other participants in the justice system.
